



Basic Description	A document or plan for a child's special education experience at school.	A document or plan for how a child will have access to learning at school.
What it Does	Provides individualized special education and related services to meet the needs of the child.	Provides services and changes to the learning environment to meet the needs of the child as adequately as other students. (An 504 plan is provided at no cost to parents.)
What Law	The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act	Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act
