


Welcome New Parent Advisor Committee (PAC) Representative!

Paralympic Medalist Teaches Goalball Techniques to Students

When John Kusku played goalball competitively for the first time, he got a bloody nose.

“I thought it was great,” said Kusku, who now plays on the men’s U.S. Goalball Team. “I wanted to keep playing.”

This past November, Kusku traveled to Ithaca, Michigan to teach goalball skills to seven students in first through sixth grade who are Blind/Visually Impaired (BVI). Goalball is specifically designed for individuals who are BVI; the objective is to throw or roll a ball through the other team’s goal.

Setting an Example

Kusku said he didn’t particularly enjoy playing goalball until he began attending the Michigan Blind Athletic Association’s Sports Camp in 1996. He began playing regionally and joined the men’s U.S. goalball team in 2009. Since then, Kusku’s team has placed in tournaments across the world and earned a silver medal at the 2016 Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. In 2020, the team is set to compete in the Paralympic Games in Tokyo. “I never knew goalball would allow me to travel outside Michigan, let alone across the world,” Kusku said.

- Step 1** BE MINDFUL OF YOUR EMOTIONAL PRESSURE GAUGE AS YOU WORK WITH YOUR CHILD'S SCHOOL.
- Step 2** PRIORITIZE AND PLAN.
- Step 3** ACTIVELY LISTEN TO UNDERSTAND THE OTHER PERSON'S PERSPECTIVE.
- Step 4** CLARIFY YOUR STATEMENTS IF YOU SEE A PUZZLED EXPRESSION ON SOMEONE'S FACE AND ASK FOR CLARIFICATION IN RETURN.
- Step 5** HAVE OPTIONS IN MIND AND OFFER THEM FOR DISCUSSION, AS NEEDED.
- Step 6** YOU'RE ONLY HUMAN.





TEN COSTLY MISTAKES TO AVOID WHEN PLANNING FOR A LOVED ONE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS



No one likes to think about what will happen to our loved ones with special needs when we are no longer here. Unfortunately, the most popular estate plan in the United States is doing nothing. While not a good idea for anyone, it is especially troubling if there is a loved one with special needs. If you do nothing, your estate is managed under the rules set forth in your state's probate code. The state probate code does NOT consider whether a loved one has special needs. This could cause the wrong person to be named to oversee your loved one's care, or even cost your loved one access to essential benefits. Doing nothing really isn't a good option. Early Childhood



Early Intervention for children birth to 36 months; supporting families so that they may enhance the development of their children within their daily routines and activities

Lapeer County Intermediate School District provides Early On services. This early intervention service is for infants and toddlers, birth to three years of age, with developmental delay(s) and/or disabilities, and their families. Research has shown that by addressing delays early on - especially between birth and age 3 - we can more effectively impact a child's development, event into adulthood.

Don't worry. But don't wait. If you think your infant or toddler may have any type of delay, contact Early On at 1-800-Early On or locally at 810-245-3994.



Helping parents and their children ages 3- 5, connect with Special Education supports if they have a suspected disability

Children grow and develop at different rates. Children who are not meeting milestones and/or struggling to learn may need additional supports to help them prepare for kindergarten. Special education programs and/or supports are available to children ages 3, 4, and 5 through each of the local school districts.

Concerned about your child? Call the ISD at 810-245-3994 to complete a simple Build Up Referral Form. Your local school district Special Education Department will reach out to you for more information and possibly an evaluation of your child.



Census data specific to Lapeer ISD showed there were 440 age and income eligible children this year. We receive funding to serve 230 eligible four year olds.

The Lapeer County ISD oversees the GSRP grant in Lapeer County. Local school districts and community based partners independently run their programs under monitoring by the LCISD and the Michigan Department of Education.

The Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) is Michigan's state-funded preschool program for four-year-old children with factors which may place them at risk of educational failure. Research on preschool programs and specific research on GSRP indicates that children provided with a high-quality preschool experience show significant positive developmental differences when compared to children from the same backgrounds who did not attend a high-quality preschool program.

The Great Start Collaborative (GSC) and Parent Coalition (GSPC) of Lapeer County connect parents, agencies, preschools, health care, and many more who are working together to improve programs and services for families with young children. The work is based on the four State of Michigan goals: children are born healthy, children are healthy, thriving and developmentally on track birth to age 8, children are developmentally ready to succeed in school at the time of school entry and children are prepared to succeed in 4th grade and beyond by reading proficiently by the end of third grade.
